### Procedure for Using Whole Group Introductory Lesson

## 1. What are Appositives?

1. Read over this definition and example with students to introduce the concept of appositives.

#### 2. What are Noun Phrases?

- 1. If students are not familiar with the concept of noun phrases, read over this definition together.
- 2. Using the examples of noun phrases, ask student volunteers to identify these parts of speech: adjectives, article (the, a or an,) the coordinating conjunction (and,) and prepositional phrases.

## 3. Find the Appositives

- 1. One by one, ask student volunteers to read aloud these sentences that include appositives.
- 2. Students identify the appositives and the parts of speech in each sentence.
- 3. Remind students that if an appositive comes in the middle of the sentence, there are two commas. Example: We played the Cougars, the soccer team from San Anselmo, on Sunday.

If an appositive comes at the end of a sentence, there is only one comma. Example: We played the Cougars, the soccer team from San Anselmo.

# 4. Combining Sentences to Make Appositives

- 1. Tell students that sometimes, you can combine two short related sentences, using an appositive.
- 2. One by one, ask student volunteers to combine the two sentences into one sentence, using an appositive. (Note: Since these sentences match the appositives in "3. Find the Appositive," students may check for correctness referring back.
